Credits:2.5 (One Semester)

Course Description:

This course is designed for those students who want to increase their skills as they prepare for the college admission process. Emphasis is placed on college essay writing, vocabulary development, formatted literature, standardized test-taking skills, and oral presentation. Special attention is paid to SAT, ACT and PARCC preparation. Students will also be introduced to varied forms of expository writing throughout the semester.

Evaluation & Assessment:

Classwork assigned in class will be due at the end of class every day, unless otherwise specified by the teacher. All class work must be turned in on time on the day it was assigned in order to receive full credit. Late classwork will receive partial credit up to two weeks. After two weeks students will not receive credit for late classwork. Essays are assigned in class and require planning and preparation. Students will receive a classwork or homework grade for each step of the writing process. (Brainstorming, Draft, Peer review, Final draft). All written student work must be individual and in the student's own voice. It is unacceptable to copy and/or plagiarize work from any source, including another student. Please refer to the student handbook for policies regarding cheating and plagiarism.

Presentations will be graded on preparation, content and delivery.

Rubrics will be provided when essays and presentations are assigned.
